## *Equip Yourself for Ministry with Pathways to a Healthy Church Event*

Are you looking for practical, quality training for yourself, your church staff or your church leaders? Are you thirsty for new ideas, networking and a fresh vision for your ministry?

If so, look no further than this year's Pathways to a Healthy Church conference. Scheduled for Saturday, August 15 at Trinity United Methodist Church in Warner Robins, the training event will feature 42 one-hour-and-15-minute workshops and two all-day workshops for participants to choose from, each designed to help congregations become healthier and to fulfill the mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ.

"Pathways to a Healthy Church has become a much anticipated annual training event because of the high quality, very practical presentations by a faculty with an established record of fruitful ministry," said Dr. Brad Brady, Assistant to the Bishop for Connectional Ministries. "Each workshop will stimulate leaders to gain new understandings and to explore fresh opportunities that will expand the disciple-making capacity of their local church."

The training, which starts at 9:45 a.m. and lasts until 3:30 p.m., features workshops on a variety of subjects, from children and youth-focused workshops to tithing/giving workshops to those focused on effective administration in small churches. Classes

include "Lord, Teach Your Church to Pray," "Wesley's Fantastic Four," and "After the First Hello," among many others.

Bishop James R. King, Jr. will lead the closing worship.

The design team urges local church leaders to carpool to the event to minimize travel costs and to maximize the benefits of the day by continuing the learning conversation during the return trip.

The early-bird registration deadline is August 7, and the conference costs \$20 per person. After this date the cost will be \$30. A boxed lunch from Chick-fil-A is included in the registration fee. Safe Sanctuaries compliant childcare is available for newborn to 5<sup>th</sup> grade children at a cost of \$3 per child, which covers the cost of their lunch.

## Mature Disciples of Jesus Christ

Several years ago, the South Georgia Annual Conference embraced God's vision for our congregations and ministries. Each word and phrase of the vision statement was prayerfully discerned to paint a picture of God's

desire for our churches and extension ministries.

Many laity and clergy lived with the vision statement and were

spiritually stretched by its claim on us as individuals and as a community of faith.

God's desire is for every congregation and ministry to "passionately grow mature disciples of Jesus Christ." This phrasing doesn't change our biblical assignment to make disciples for the transformation of the world.

However, it does communicate that our personal development as disciples is anything but static.

Being a follower of Jesus Christ is a continuing process toward spiritual maturity. Or to use the words of John Wesley, we are to "go on to perfection."

We are all familiar with the human

developmental process. There are many facets of life that develop between birth and mature adulthood. Much of the developmental process is nurtured along and called forth by others.

Parents, relatives, teachers, playmates, classmates, and colleagues are significant partners in our development. Yet, there comes a time when we move from bottle to solid food; from dependence to interdependence; and from childhood to maturity.

So it is with the spiritual life. Many play a role in our development as followers of Christ. The Holy Spirit uses a large cast of characters as "living vessels," inviting us to new life, but prodding us toward spiritual maturity.

I have worked with hundreds of congregations as they assess their current effectiveness in growing mature disciples. Each church scores itself highest in its effectiveness in nurturing people in Christian living. Sadly, many of these same congregations admit their paltry record in leading people to Christ or in sending out disciples to be representatives of Christ in the world.

Churches with these levels of effectiveness have reached a plateau around helping people move to the next level of spiritual

development toward maturity. It is as if people of all ages are frozen as spiritual infants, children or adolescents.

One true mark of spiritual maturity is when disciples become disciple-makers. This occurs when Christians are nurtured and equipped in the faith to such a point that they can extend a spiritual invitation to someone else; or that they can feel empowered enough to move outside their comfort zone as a representative of Jesus Christ.

As we prepare for a new year of Christian education and other nurturing ministries, I invite you to join me in evaluating where you are in your spiritual journey. Is there evidence to support the notion that you are maturing in your faith by expanding your discipleship to the point that you are a disciple-maker?

Those of us in nurturing roles may even set new goals for this year's ministry. Can you think of ways to nurture people from spiritual infancy toward greater maturity? Why not find some ways to intentionally nudge your spiritual companions out of their comfort zone so they can become part of God's amazing salvation history. It will be a spiritually exhilarating experience they will never forget!

UMR has developed a successful business model that maximizes efficiency and controls costs while allowing each conference to assume primary responsibility for their own edition.

After making the decision to continue a print piece and making the decision to enfold the paper up under the Office of Connectional Ministries, Kara Witherow was hired as the editor to report, write and coordinate the *South Georgia Advocate* edition. Kara brings extensive writing and communications experience to her new role, including employment with Gaylord Entertainment, parent company of Gaylord Opryland Resort & Convention Center in Nashville, Tennessee.

## Benevolent benefactor donates \$500,000 to CCPI; challenges Georgians to match

The Rev. Karmah Early isn't sure how old she is or how many years she served as a United Methodist pastor in a rural area outside of Monrovia, Liberia.

She heard God's call to ministry when she was a young girl and says she was "happy" to be a pastor.

She has been blind for several years. "I can't distinguish night from day. My life is total darkness," she says.

The US \$60 pension she receives every three months from the Liberia Annual Conference is not enough to guarantee food every day. It is certainly not enough to repair the holes in her roof or the cracks in the walls.

The holes and cracks allow scorpions, snakes and harmful bugs into her room. If no one comes to her aid, Early is a captive of her dark world.

Early and others like her -- nearly 2,000 retired pastors, lay workers and surviving spouses in Africa, Asia and Eastern Europe -- are struggling to survive and to meet their basic needs, resorting to growing their own food, relying on their children and creating products to sell. They are, however, receiving more attention now as The United Methodist Church develops systems for providing pensions to pastors, church workers and dependents through the Central Conference Pension Initiative (CCPI).

The CCPI is a long-term solution that provides financial security in retirement for dedicated church leaders and surviving spouses who would otherwise have little or no means of supporting themselves.

South Georgia United Methodists have a special opportunity to help meet the needs of those like Early by offering to support CCPI. This

opportunity is made even more significant by a \$500,000 donation by an anonymous donor in Georgia.

This donor has challenged United Methodists in both the South and North Georgia Annual Conferences to respond with donations of their own. There is potential for an additional gift later in the year depending on the level of support generated among Georgia United Methodists. The donor is challenging every local United Methodist Church to participate significantly in the campaign so that together the original gift of \$500,000 can be matched or exceeded.

The hope is to raise more than \$1.5 million for CCPI in Georgia alone. If Georgians respond with that level of generosity, approximately 150 central conference retirees could be supported by South Georgia and North Georgia United Methodists (for every \$10,000 contributed, approximately one central conference retiree will be supported).

"As a small child, God showed me that the whole world belongs to God; when one hurts, we hurt, too," said James R. King, Jr., South Georgia resident bishop. "We celebrate the generosity of this donor and accept the

challenge before us as an opportunity presented by God."

At the Annual Conference session in June, Bishop King encouraged each person to prayerfully consider making a pledge or donation to CCPI and to also take information back to their local churches and inform their congregation about the plight of United Methodist clergy around the world and how they can help ease their suffering through giving to the CCPI. The Conference would like to collect individual gifts and multi-year pledges by October 1.

"To whom much is given, will much be required," said King.

When Early was a girl, someone took her to church, and she worked there for many years.

"I started to hear a voice say I needed to be in ministry," she says. "I am very happy and satisfied that God called me to be a pastor." Even now she knows God is always with her. "My Father is taking care of me," she says.

## Web event will help equip E-zekiel users

The South Georgia Conference is teaming up with E-zekiel to bring in professional E-zekiel trainer, Dacia Gullede, for a day-long training September 18, 2009, at Vineville United Methodist Church in Macon. Dacia will show us how to use E-zekiel to build and maintain a great web site.

E-zekiel is an online software that allows you to publish a dynamic, interactive, professional-looking web site without being a programmer, without all the technical hassles, and without the expense of traditional web site development.

In three 1.5-hour sessions, we'll look at the tips and tricks of the pages and panels managers, explore the management of events (calendar) and forms, and learn how to utilize the syndication manager (podcasting, blogging, etc.) as well as discuss streaming media options such as E-

zekiel.tv. At the end of the day, we'll have a special 2-hour Q&A/Lab session for anyone wanting more information.

A power supply and wireless internet connection will be available for anyone who wishes to bring a laptop. The first three sessions will be presentation style, although those who have a laptop present will be encouraged to follow along on their own sites. The final session may allow for some hands-on time but will depend entirely on the total participant count.

The training day will begin at 10:00 a.m. and conclude at 5:30 p.m. Early
