Dusty Feet and Daily Bible Reading

Reading is fundamental. For more than forty years we have heard this slogan in the fight against illiteracy among children and youth. Reading is certainly fundamental in today's time.

Daily Bible reading is fundamental, too. Indeed, daily Bible reading for United Methodists is fundamental to the Methodist Way. In the third of the General Rules ("Attend to the ordinances of God"), daily Bible reading is one of the ways we fulfill both the spirit and letter of this rule.

Retired Bishop Rueben Job has written an inspiring book about the General Rules of Methodism: *Three Simple Rules*. Wesley's General Rules, as you may recall, are simply: (1) Do no harm. (2) Do good. (3) Attend to the ordinances of God.

To give greater clarity and relevance to the third rule, Bishop Job has paraphrased it in this manner: "Stay in love with God." When we are in love with God, we want to stay near God. We want to know more about God. We want to be with God. We want to be pleasing to God.

Karl Barth, a German theologian in the last century, described the Bible in a powerful image when he wrote: "The Word of God that comes to us through the Scriptures is the long, strong hand of God that reaches out after us. What will happen to us in the grip of this hand is none of our business. We only need to know that we are in the grip of his hand. He who knows this understands the hearts of the Bible."

Barth's words remind us that we are not to read the Bible for information only, as we might read an encyclopedia. We are to read the Bible

for inspiration – for the God-breathed, inspired word that it is. Yet inspiration is not an end unto itself in Bible reading.

Ultimately we read the Bible for transformation – the transformation of our heart and mind in the image and likeness of God. We read the Bible to discover who we are so that we may open ourselves to the Holy Spirit's power to re-create us in God's image.

Throughout his ministry with us in South Georgia Bishop Mike Watson has encouraged South Georgia United Methodists to read through the Bible each year. Bishop Watson knows the power of God's word to inform, inspire, and transform our lives through Jesus Christ.

Rabbi Yose ben Yoezer, one of the sages in the Jewish Midrash, said to his students, "Cover yourself with the dust of your rabbi's feet." In other words, follow close behind the rabbi as he walked, talked and taught. Walk close enough so as not to miss a pearl of wisdom from the rabbi's mouth.

Let dusty feet abound across the South Georgia Conference this year as we stay close to Jesus Christ as he teaches us through the Holy Bible.

God takes great delight upon those with dusty feet who eagerly seek to hear every word that comes from our Savior and Lord.

Are your feet dusty? Let's get our feet really dusty this year!

Building Arks

With the extreme drought at this time in all of the state, it does not seem that a modern day Noah will be building arks anytime soon. However, Warren Buffett's Noah Rule is still helpful.

Buffett, as most people know, is one of the world's richest men. Known as the "Oracle of Omaha," Buffett once wrote what is

now known as the Noah Rule: "Predicting rain doesn't count; building arks does."

United Methodists know that it is very important for individuals to make a personal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and be a disciple. A great deal of what we do in the church is designed to help people make this decision.

Evangelistic services, invitational preaching, witness or testimony – these

are just some of the ways United Methodists have led people to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Making the decision to follow Jesus is an essential step, I believe, but it is not sufficient in itself. Professing faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior is not a terminal step with Christian discipleship.

Nurture of faith is an essential and on-going process that never ends. Lovett Weems, Jr. has written that while conversion was always the chief aim of preaching in the Wesleyan Movement, John Wesley was equally emphatic about the necessity of Christian nurture. Wesley wrote, "Converts without nurture are like stillborn babies. Never encourage the devil by snatching souls from him that you cannot nurture." In fact, Wesley intentionally planned his preaching points where he knew that there were adequate opportunities for nurture for those who wanted to grow in Christ.

Building arks is much harder than predicting rain. Building arks involves visioning, dreaming, preparing, and designing. Building arks is hard and sweaty work. Building arks involves risk, even pain.

Nurturing Christians in the faith and in the process of growth and maturation in their relationship with Jesus Christ is not an easy process. Just ask those who faithfully teach in Sunday School, lead in life-transforming Bible studies, serve as mentors in Confirmation, or lead in small groups, etc. Nurture also involves visioning, dreaming preparing. It also involves risk and even pain at times.

And, like in Noah's case –who built an ark before it even rained! – nurture must take place long before we begin to see any results of our labors.

Thanks be to God for all among us who are faithful, fruitful, and bold nurturers. May your numbers increase!

Conference seeks Congregational Specialist

The Office of Connectional Ministries is taking applications for a Congregational Specialist, a part-time position in a pilot program lasting up to twelve months.

The Congregational Specialist will have four major areas of responsibility: (1) work with Natural Church Development in two South Georgia districts, (2) assist District Superintendents in implementing Safe Sanctuaries in 2008, (3) where appropriate work with the Urban Task Force(s), and (4) assist in deploying resources for making disciples.

Ideal candidates will display strong communication and teamwork skills, and be willing to receive additional training in conflict resolution, leadership, Safe Sanctuaries and

coaching. The Congregational Specialist will work under the direction of the Director of Connectional Ministries and in conjunction with the District Superintendents where assigned.

Applicants should have a minimum of a Bachelor's degree, be active in a United Methodist church for the past two years, undergo a full background check and be willing/able to travel extensively (including overnight). Ideal applicants will be teachable, open to new training, able to accept temporary employment and capable of working in multiple church settings with diverse groups.

The Congregational Specialist position is a Pilot Ministry with funding for 10 to 12 months.

Depending on outcomes, the position could become a permanent part time position, if approved by the South Georgia Conference. A stipend will be offered, plus travel and other expenses.

Thank You to the Churches of South Georgia

January 10 was the last day for accepting payments on apportionments for 2007. In case you are not familiar with this word, United

Methodists define “apportionments” as the portion of the conference budget that each local church is asked to pay.

Apportionments received from local churches help fund mission projects around the world, support United Methodist Colleges and Seminaries, and provide funds to help pay for children and youth camps and weekend retreats. They enable the conference to start new churches, revitalize existing churches, and begin Hispanic congregations. Our conference is able to operate the Moore Museum at Epworth By The Sea, allow for local church training events including safe sanctuary training, help support Wesley Foundation ministries on college campuses all over Georgia and assist students who are attending seminary. Apportionments also allow us to hold license to preach schools, help provide health insurance and pension benefits for our ministers, and assist in paying salaries and benefits for conference employees and the expenses related to operation of the offices. We are able to pay expenses of annual conference and reimburse persons for the expenses related to their service on conference committees.

When churches pay their apportionments we have the funds needed to fund all of the above and many other items which are not listed. By working together, churches are able to do more than any one church can do on its own.

We are not finished entering

payments into the computer, but it looks like we will receive over \$10,275,000 on conference apportionments for 2007, another \$1,165,000 on district apportionments, almost \$142,000 on special Sunday offerings, and well over \$2 million donated to Advance Mission Special projects. This does not count the over \$6,000,000 that churches have paid to us for the cost of their minister’s pensions and health insurance.

So it with a heart overflowing with gratitude that I say, “Thank You!” I am thankful for local churches who pay their apportionments each month, thankful for the churches who are able to pay them early, thankful for persons sending payments to us by overnight mail to assure the money arrives, and thankful for the persons--both ministers and lay persons--who drive to Macon on the last day bringing checks to make their church’s final payment.

I am also thankful for the many ministers and the lay persons in our local churches who support the payment of apportionments year after year by giving their money as well as making sure the checks are written to pay them. I realize that some churches are struggling financially so I am thankful that a local church is willing to have a called meeting and work extra hard to pay all they can on the apportionments. It makes me especially grateful when I realize that a church chose to pay the apportionments in full when they could have held some funds back for a special project at their local church.

I am grateful for district superintendents and their secretaries who call or write and encourage churches to pay apportionments. I am grateful that they are willing to do this even when they know that some churches do not want to pay

nor even to be reminded about paying.

I am thankful for the employees of the Administrative Services Office who arrive early and stay late as we work to receive and record correctly all of the payments from local churches. I am grateful for employees who will come in during the Christmas holidays to get the mail, count the money and deposit it into the bank. I am thankful for employees who believe in our mission projects enough to call churches so that we can tell them they are close to receiving the “three star award” for mission giving but are still in need of one more check for that missing project. I am grateful for the employees who answer questions about statistical reports and preparing W-2 forms for ministers; employees who are willing to check with Health Flex to find out why a retiree was told they did not have insurance; and an employee who will listen and answer questions about retirement and then ask if there is anything else they can do to help. I am grateful for these employees because all of this work is going on at the same time. And thankfully they still come back to work the next day!

As I count my many blessings at the beginning of a new year, I am grateful to be a part of the United Methodist Church and am fortunate enough to also get to work for and with the churches, ministers and lay persons of the South Georgia Conference.

UMW Embrace Background Checks for Safe Sanctuaries

The South Georgia Conference United Methodist Women (UMW) met at Epworth By The Sea, January 4-6, 2008, for the Conference Executive Committee Meeting and training on Safe Sanctuaries. The training session on Safe Sanctuaries was led by Reverend Denise Walton, Associate Director of Connectional Ministries.

As a group, the Conference UMW Executive Committee discussed the development of their Safe Sanctuaries Policy. All of the persons in attendance participate in programs and activities offered for youth. Therefore, they all have direct or indirect contact with the youth and would need to have a background check according to the Safe Sanctuaries guidelines.

At the close of the Safe Sanctuaries training, the United Methodist Women's Conference Executive Committee voted to participate as a group and complete the required background checks. It was a historical event as each person filled out a background

check request form and submitted the information to the UMW conference president, Mrs. Gloria Morgan.

In a follow-up letter to all the attendees, Mrs. Morgan stated, "Thank each of you for your concern and determination to have background checks, for your work to set up a policy and for your willingness to be accountable as we work with children and youth in the South Georgia Conference."

"I have never been so grateful to be called a United Methodist Woman," said Reverend Denise Walton. "By volunteering to get background checks the United Methodist Women are once again advocating for the needs of vulnerable children and youth."

In June 2007, the South Georgia Annual Conference adopted a conference policy on Safe Sanctuaries. Local churches within the South Georgia Annual conference must have a Safe Sanctuaries policy by December 31, 2008 with full implementation of the policy expected by January 1, 2009.
