In the Grip of God's Hand

In many congregations today, after the reading of the scripture, the reader will say, "This is the Word of God for the people of God." The congregation responds with these words, "Thanks be to God." The precedence for this response to the reading and hearing of scripture is found in one of the holy days of ancient Judaism. During the celebration of their new year, one day would be set aside to give thanks to God for God's gift of the Torah, the first part of the Hebrew scriptures [and the first books of our Old Testament].

Oftentimes we read the Bible and we may be put off by the demands that holy scripture places upon us. The more we read the Bible, the more apparent it becomes to us that God has high expectations of us.

In the beginning, the ancient Hebrews knew that God had high expectations of them, too – but they did not know what these expectations were. They had no sacred writings to teach them.

Pleasing God was a hit-and-miss proposition, because they did not always know what God desired. Hence they received the Torah with joy and thanksgiving. In spite of the numerous laws and rituals for them to obey, now they knew how to live and order their lives in a manner pleasing to God. Hence they set aside an entire day each year to give thanks to God for the gift of holy scripture.

Certainly the most obvious way to express our joy and gratitude for the Bible is to read it daily and faithfully and to strive diligently to live into the divine truths found within it.

Dr. Jay Harris, Senior Pastor of College Place UMC in Brunswick, has developed an interesting format for reading through the Bible in 2009: the Layered Bible Study. The guide and helpful notes are found on our conference website, www.sgaumc.org, under "Resources." You will find the Layered Bible Journey both helpful and inspiring – but only if you faithfully read God's Word this year.

Decades ago, Karl Barth wrote, "The Word of God that comes to us through the Scriptures is the long, strong hand of God that reaches out after us. What will happen to us in the grip of this hand is none of our business. We only need to know that we are in the grip of his hand. He who knows this understands the heart of the Bible."

As we negotiate our way through the opportunities and the adversities of this new year, may we do so in the grip of His hand.

The perfect pot was proud of its

accomplishments, but the poor cracked pot was embarrassed by its imperfection. Finally, the cracked pot shared its shame with the old woman.

The old woman replied, "Have you ever noticed there are beautiful flowers on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side?"

She continued, "I knew of your imperfection, so I planted flower seeds on your side of the path. For two years, I have enjoyed beautiful flowers as I did my daily chore. Without you, there would have been no beauty in my life."

Each of us is wonderfully and beautifully made, but each of us is imperfect. We have our weaknesses and flaws, just as we have our strengths and virtues. But God has fashioned every imperfect believer into the Body of Christ. Walk your way to a healthier '09 -- and earn money while doing it!

At the beginning of the New Year many of us make resolutions about things we will try to do differently during this year. Each year I start off determined that this office will give better service to the churches and ministers of the conference.

My first idealistic resolution is that we will always have plenty of time to answer their questions in as much depth as each caller wants. The second resolution is at the same time we will still get the work done each day, that we will have all the reports that every committee wants as soon as they want them (in fact, that we will have already finished them so we can send them out immediately as soon as they ask) and that no one will have to stay after hours to get it done.

I also usually make resolutions for myself – that I will try to get home in time to cook supper, that I will call my mother more often, that I will find more time to play with my grandchildren, and that I will establish a regular time to exercise and actually stick to it.

Last month I started working on at least one of my annual resolutions – walking more. I want to tell you about it.

Our conference's group insurance, HealthFlex, is encouraging all of our participants – **active and retired ministers and spouses that participate in HealthFlex** – to take advantage of an opportunity to begin down the path toward better fitness. The new Center for Health (established by

General Conference) and HealthFlex are pleased to introduce the Virgin HealthMiles walking program. **There is no cost to HealthFlex participants.**

As a part of Virgin HealthMiles program each person will receive a free pedometer to help them track their progress. **A part of the program includes earning "Health Miles," which are like reward points that are earned by tracking your daily activity and demonstrating improvement in your overall health.** Participants can earn up to \$300 over a twelve month period.

Our office had the opportunity to get started about a month early in order for us to be ready to answer questions and help participants sign up. One thing I like about this program is that it did not tell me immediately that I had to walk 10,000 steps a day nor does it say that I should walk for 30 minutes three or four times a week. That would sound like exercise. This program is letting me start where I am. It is not making me feel guilty if I only walk a couple of thousand steps in a day.

I am already discovering that I am willing to park further out in the parking lot so I get a few more steps

in, or when I shop I walk up or down the stairs or the escalator so my number of steps will increase. So far, my walking is not the kind that will burn enough calories that I actually lose weight; however, maybe I will be doing that kind of walking soon. My goal is by annual conference to be in better shape. Maybe I will have earned enough "Health Miles" points that I can cash them in and buy a new pair of walking shoes.

The pedometer you receive can be plugged into your computer and will transfer your record of steps taken, give you encouragement to continue walking, and tell you how many reward points, "Health Miles," you have earned. It is so amazingly quick and easy to transfer the information – even a "technology challenged" person like me can make it work.

By now you should have received information in the mail telling you about the program and how to sign up. Another way to begin is by going to the General Board of Pensions website, www.gbop.org, and clicking on HealthFlex/WebMD. If you cannot remember your password call our office (1-800-535-4224) and we will help you with it.

After you sign up, your pedometer will arrive in just a few days, and you can start walking and earning "Health Miles" rewards. Who knows, by annual conference you may earn enough points to get a gift card to a favorite restaurant so you can enjoy a meal out with friends.

What do you know? This year I may actually keep one of my New Year's Resolutions!

Conference Website Features New Video Portal

The South Georgia Conference website has a new addition – InFocus – an online video portal that allows South Georgia United Methodists to view, post and share videos. The posted videos can also be embedded into local church websites or personal blogs.

InFocus is a ministry tool that seeks to better equip local churches in their online ministry. Many churches would like a way to showcase video on their websites, but can't afford the expensive hosting required. Other churches would like to share their ministry videos and view others from throughout the conference. With a user interface similar to other video

sharing systems, InFocus allows conference members to easily add videos to the portal, free of charge and free from distracting advertising. In addition, all content has to be viewed and approved by the site administrator before it can be publicly viewed. This will insure that only appropriate content is available to view on the site.

We are excited to provide this resource to our local churches and Conference ministry teams. Today with computers, affordable video cameras and even cell phones many people are active video producers. Our hope is that this video portal site allows South Georgia United Methodists to use their video skills to share the gospel of Jesus Christ.

New membership vows and ritual now available

The new baptismal and professing membership vows of The United Methodist Church, adopted by delegates to the 2008 General Conference, the denomination's top legislative body, are now available at www.gbod.org/worship. Among the many actions taken by the 2008 General Conference were revisions to paragraphs 217 and 225 of the *2004 Book of Discipline* that changed vows for all professing members in The United Methodist Church and clarified the process for receiving members from other denominations. The new language of 217.6 will read: 6. To faithfully participate in its ministries by their prayers, their presence, their gifts, their service, **and their witness**. The changes in the vows in the *Discipline* also affect the official ritual of the church in Baptismal Covenants I, II, and IV (UMH 33 ff., UMH 39 ff., and UMH 50 ff.). All these changes went into effect January 1, 2009.

Gateway Community to be constituted January 25th

Gateway Community Church, a United Methodist congregation in Pooler, Ga, began on June 26, 2006, with a group of 20 people in the living room of Rev. Matt Hearn. They began with four simple goals:

- Goal 1: Create a relaxed, casual atmosphere where people can feel welcomed and comfortable.
- Goal 2: Provide excellent child care where those who come feel like their children are safe, having fun, and learning about a God who loves them.
- Goal 3: Have music that would be familiar to those who might be coming for the first time, or the first time in a long time.
- Goal 4: Deliver messages that speak to the felt needs that we all share.
